### A Better Chance in Darien <u>Really</u> Needs Your Support This Year!

ABC in Darien has been fortunate over its eleven year history to have had the generous support of hundreds of Darien families. Each year in May the ABC Board sends out a solicitation. In the fall, follow-up mailings and telephone calls are made to remind potential donors. By January, when the campaign ends, enough money is usually raised to pay for the operating costs associated with our program. Typically, we raise upwards of \$40,000 each year from more than four hundred families.

Unlike many other ABC programs, Darien's ABC receives more than 90% of its financial support from individuals. The few corporate dollars we get are earmarked for specific purposes such as enrichment. ABC in Darien receives no financial support from ABC national headquarters.

As one of only twenty-four public school programs in the country, ABC in Darien is somewhat unique. Unlike private school ABC programs where the students reside in dorms and

eat in cafeterias, Darien's ABC scholars are housed and fed in a separate home. The house, at 11 Brookside Road, belongs to the First Congregational Church of Darien. The church generously leases the house to our program for just \$1.00 per year. Without this gift, our fundraising task would probably be double what it is today. (please see page 4)

## TAMMY CHOSES THE UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA



#### We need you....(con't)

Even with the "free" use of the house, Darien's ABC program encounters some significant housing expenses. We are responsible for all maintenance and improvements to the house. With six active teenagers plus the resident directors living in an older home, these expenses can be significant. We also pay for oil, electricity, water, garbage removal, sewer fees and insurance coverage.

Feeding the students is our biggest expense. Food and food preparation expenses make up one third of our current budget. Our students are served nutritious meals but care is taken to make sure we do not exceed our budget. Our average allocation per student per day for food is just \$8.83.

Last year, ABC in Darien celebrated its tenth anniversary. We planned to use this occasion to try to raise extra money to build up our contingency fund. There are a number of capital expen-

ditures that must be made to improve the house. Also, v believe it is very important to slowly build up a reserve in cast the church decides some day that it can not afford to lease us the house at such favorable rates.

Unfortunately we ran into the worst recession this region has experienced in decades. Many people who have historically supported us were unable to do so. Others were forced to reduce their annual contribution. The result was that last year's fund-raising campaign came up short of our annual operating fund requirements by almost 20%. Rather than building up our reserves, we were forced to use them up.

We hope that as the local economy rebounds, you and your family will be able to provide financial support to those groups that you feel are worthwhile.

ABC needs a successful fund-raising year to recover from last year and to build our reserves back up. We hope you will give as much as possible. The money will be carefully spent to help six remarkable girls get a better chance at a fine education.
