ROPES COURSE!


Building confidence, Trust and Teamwork!

Recent Darien High School graduates Bettina Arkhurst and Jocelyn Mendez are bursting with anticipation for the next chapter as they sail off to college. Over the past four years these ABC scholars distinguished themselves as leaders and role models in the community and at DHS.

Bettina excelled in a multitude of disciplines including math and science. Beginning her sophomore year, Bettina participated in the Authentic Science and Research program at DHS. Additionally, she was a member of the National Honor Society, DHS Track (four years), and Dance Team. This fall, Bettina is pursuing a similar core of academic disciplines at Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, where she plans to major in Biological Engineering.

Bettina said that she feels her time in Darien prepared her not only for the academic challenges of college, but also for the process of acclimating to a new environment. "I will spend most of my freshman year fulfilling general requirements. I am mainly looking forward to a great year!" She is also looking forward to the many research opportunities present at MIT.

Joining ABC in Darien in her sophomore year, Jocelyn quickly made her mark in music and the arts. A Dream in the Making

Thirty-four years ago a determined group of Darien residents were in search of a dwelling where they could house four students plus two Resident Directors in order to launch the ABC in Darien academic program. To those intrepid founders of ABC in Darien, purchasing a house was out of the question. Luckily the First Congregational Church of Darien was willing to lease a house to ABC for \$1 a year. And so it went for 34 years.

Buying a house remained a distant dream until 2012, when an angel donor stepped forward with an extremely generous gift. With additional funds pledged from the Board of Directors, the dream started to look feasible. The search for a permanent home began anew. Locating a house that would accommodate a minimum of 10 adults in Darien within the budget was no small task. In December 2013, after a year of looking, ABC in Darien bought a four bedroom colonial at 103 Tokeneke Road.

The location close to town was perfect, but it was clear that renovations would be necessary. Shortly after closing, plans to renovate the home were on the drawing boards. Architect Beth Harrington-Howes and local builder Bob Calve of Fox Hill Builders met with a Building Committee co-chaired by Jackie Scott and Lynn Hamlen along with members of the ABC Board Yvette Eenkema van Dijk, Robin Ackerman, Susan Wilson, Jane Yezzi and Vyvyan Burns. Funds garnered through a local Capital fund raising Campaign, co-chaired by Bob Johnston and Mark Scott, provided financing for the improvements. In May 2014, ABC in Darien broke ground on their new home.

Under the adept partnership of Bob Calve and his team working with Jackie Scott and hers, renovations at 103 Tokeneke Road have progressed smoothly. Renovations included expanding the footprint to add living space for the Resident Directors and their family. Construction included

Most couples would have found juggling the schedules of an infant, a toddler, and six teenagers taxing, but the Egans rose to the challenge. Seemingly effortlessly, the growing family group settled in to a warmhearted and caring pattern. The boys adore their older sisters and wait eagerly for them to return home at the end of the day. "They are constantly looking for the girls and asking about them when they aren't home," Katie commented.

Katie earned her Ph.D. in Epidemiology at the Yale School of Health last June. She now telecommutes from home for a Massachusetts firm as a Research Scientist/Epidemiologist designing public health studies. and writing reports and manuscripts for publication, while Pat teaches American and World History at Darien High School and coordinates the school's renowned China Exchange Program; it is a busy household.

This October, the Egans brace for even more firsts, as they oversee ABC's move to 103 Tokeneke Road. According to Katie, "The girls are very excited about the new house. We can't wait to move in and make it into a real home for ABC. This year's group is a positive, upbeat crowd who will adapt well to moving and the changing responsibilities that come with a new home.

adding new bathrooms and two new bedrooms, renovating the mudroom, enlarging the kitchen, converting a screened porch into a windowed dining room, painting walls, connecting to the city sewer line and enhancing the driveway.

"Ring's End Lumber and Fox Hill Builders, along with their skilled trades people, were instrumental in keeping us on budget and on time. Their joint efforts elevated our project to new heights in terms of quality craftsmanship and finishing touches. We would not have been able to afford the same end product on our budget. Our gratitude is beyond measure," commented Jane Yezzi, ABC in Darien co-president.

We are excited to be moving the program into a permanent home. A move-in date is set for mid-October, and here will begin a new chapter for A Better Chance in Darien.



ABC IN DARIEN FACTS

MISSION: To provide scholarships to academically talented girls of color from underserved areas allowing them to realize their academic and social potential while living in Darien and attending DHS.

ENROLLMENT: Six girls currently from Connecticut, New York, New Jersey and Georgia.

HISTORY: Thirty-four years in Darien; 43 girls have graduated from the program.

WHERE DO THEY GO? Graduates have entered colleges such as Columbia, Cornell, George Washington, Syracuse and MIT.

STAFF: Two Resident Directors, Executive Director & Tutors.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS: Twenty-two local residents.

HOST FAMILIES: Six families host the girls one weekend and one Sunday each month.

RESIDENCE: 103 Tokeneke Road in Darien.

THE BUDGET: \$140,000 per year, covering staff, food, utilities, house maintenance, enrichment expenses & supplies.
