MISSION: To provide scholarships to academically talented minority girls from underserved areas allowing them to realize their academic and social potential while living in Darien and attending DHS.

**ENROLLMENT:** Seven girls currently from New York, New Jersey and Massachusetts.

**HISTORY:** Twenty-five years in Darien; 34 girls have graduated from the program.

WHERE DO THEY GO? Graduates have entered colleges such as Columbia, Cornell, UVA and Syracuse.

**STAFF:** Two resident directors, cook and tutors, as needed.

**BOARD OF DIRECTORS:** Twenty-six local residents. **HOST FAMILIES:** Thirteen families host the girls two

weekends each month.

**RESIDENCE:** 11 Brookside Road—provided by the First Congregational Church, maintained by ABC in Darien. THE BUDGET: \$100,000 per year, covering staff, food, utilities, house maintenance, enrichment expenses and supplies.
