T t is hard to believe that four years has flown by since **■** Morgana Coombs and Silvia Puma arrived at Darien's ABC House as wide-eyed freshmen students. During the past four years, these young women have grown and made their marks at the High School and in the house. Independent and strong, they are definitely ready for whatever comes their way.

Morgana Coombs is a bright, bubbly, self-described "people person." When asked what she liked most about being in Darien, Morgana replied that it was having the opportunity to make so many new friends and to meet lots of people who are different from those she knew growing up in New York. At first it was hard to leave her friends back home. With her radiant smile and outgoing personality, she was soon surrounded by new friends. Morgana is already looking forward to making many new lasting friendships in college.

Living at the house Morgana gained a sense of belonging in Darien. For three years, resident directors Karyn Montague and Steve Lexander offered guidance and security, while her host families, the Simms, the Bergens and the Marks provided the space to relax. Seniors, Chadae Chang and Kendra Barber opened their hearts to a young Morgana. She recently remarked, "Home is where you make it. In the house, we became a small family and loved each other like siblings. And all of us, although similar in being inner-city kids, have brought different things to the table because of our cultural differences."

At DHS Morgana found a mentor in Mr. Cabrera, her freshman Western Civilization teacher. As a sophomore she was relieved to find herself again in Mr. Cabrera's history class. Morgana says that during her time at DHS, Mr.





Cabrera was there to keep her on track if she started to veer off.

Next year Morgana will attend Temple University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania where she plans to major in mathematics, potentially with a minor in African-American Studies. Previously she had considered being a doctor, but now she feels that a career in finance is more suited to her strengths. Additionally, she hopes to be able to go abroad while in college. This summer she is hoping to intern with UBS Warburg, an ABC sponsor.

In parting, Morgana offers these words to the Darien ABC girls who remain behind: "Make the best of what you are given. It's up to you to choose the path which you follow, and you have the option of making it easy or hard, but it all lies in your hands."

Growing up as the oldest of four children in New York City, Silvia Puma wanted more independence. An eighth grade teacher at the

Mott Hall School urged her to apply to the ABC program. And, off to Darien she went. There were times during freshman year when Silvia didn't think she would make it through four years at DHS. She was homesick. Silvia made it through her freshman year and has been soaring ever since. A true trailblazer, Silvia provided the example for her siblings to look outside of New York to pursue their education. Her brother is currently at the ABC program in New Canaan. And her sister will attend Taft next fall!

Silvia feels that she has grown in many ways and is ready to face the world on her own. As a participant in the Authentic Science Research Program at DHS, she spent three years studying leprosy. She was invited to work two consecutive summers in a lab at the Rockefeller University where performed her own experiments. Entering several science competitions

THE APPLICATION PROCESS FOR ABC STUDENTS

Decision night was, and always is, difficult. It is an inspirational and humbling experience to meet such great kids and their families with such remarkable devotion to finding the best education possible.

t's that time of year again. Applications, standardized test scores and teacher rec-Lommendations have been reviewed. interviews conducted and acceptances mailed out. No, it's not the "college process", although it's a great dry run! Instead, it's the much anticipated and always difficult selection process at ABC in Darien. As Chairperson of the Selection Committee for the past six years, this process produces some of my greatest joy and satisfaction, as well as many sleepless nights caused from knowing the decisions we make have the potential to change the course of a young person's life.

This past year, over 6,100 students of color applied to ABC National with the hope of finding a high school that could nurture their talent. Of those, over 1,100 applications were sent to member ABC schools for consideration. In the end, only 551 students (or approximately 10%) of the original applicant pool of 6,100 received an offer of acceptance. The process that these students followed was very similar to applying to college. Each applicant had to take the SSAT, get two teacher recommendations, send their school transcripts, write essays and have an interview with an ABC National representative. ABC National then whittled down the pool and sent applications to those schools where they

This year Darien received forty-five applications from students all over the country. Our selection committee narrowed down the pool to seven girls that we thought showed exceptional promise and invited them and their parents to an interview weekend. Each candidate first spent the day at Darien High School going to classes with our own ABC students. Afterwards, they interviewed for approximately forty five minutes with our Selection Committee, comprised of six to eight Board members, and stayed overnight at the ABC house to get a feel for how the house operates. These candidates also took four different subject tests to assess their academic skill levels. We spent approximately an hour with each girl's parents explaining our program and finding about more about their daughter. Lastly, we spoke with each girl's teachers or guidance counselor for additional input. At the end of the weekend, we felt we had a strong handle on the personality, intellectual curiosity, drive and moral character of each candidate.

Decision night was, and always is, difficult. It is an inspirational and humbling experience to meet such great kids and their families with such remarkable devotion to finding the best education possible. Many of their stories would bring tears to your eyes. At this time of year, we always wish our house was three times bigger so we could take all the qualified girls that are looking for a place, instead of just two, which is what space permits. This year, after deciding that three of the seven candidates were a great fit for our program, we made an exception and made offers to all three! So, this Fall we are adding bunk beds and closet space and hoping that "good things come in threes".

ABC is an outstanding program which truly can change the course of a young girl's life. It is a great privilege and pleasure to be so involved in the seminal decision that propels so many wonderful young women into highly productive lives that contribute to society.

LIFE BEYOND THE BOOKS

Throughout the school year, in addition to their scholarly pursuits the young women at the Darien ABC house have filled their free time with a broad range of activities organized by Jennienne Burke, ABC Enrichment Chair and Board member experiences that were fun and challenging, exciting and good for the soul.







In October, the girls attended a Twilight Bowling Nite with other local ABC houses, complete with fluorescent bowling balls and great music. Some made new friends, while others caught up with old ones from the Westport, New Canaan and Ridgefield ABC programs. Resident Directors and Board members also attended. giving all a chance to get to know their colleagues and exchange ideas. Later in the month the scholars got into the Halloween spirit with a visit the **Haunted** House at Rye Playland.

During the holiday season the girls ventured into New York City for an exciting performance of **Ballet Hispanico** at the Joyce Theatre, followed by a visit to

Madame Tussauds Wax Museum. The dynamic, highly acclaimed dance company fuses ballet, modern and Latin dance forms into a spirited image of the contemporary Hispanic world - a rare treat for all who attended. At Madame Tussauds the girls posed with their favorite stars cast in wax – from Whoopi Goldberg, J Lo, and the Spice Girls, to Will Smith and the late Rosa Parks. They also made their "television debut," giving interviews for their own mock **A&E Biography** show. This clearly tops the list as the best event of the year!



In January, the girls visited Madison Square **Garden** to watch the New York Knicks play the **Washington Wizards** – VIP style. Seated in a luxury box courtesy of our friends

at UBS, they enjoyed great basketball and fine dining. A real winning combination! And as exams approached, they were treated to a relaxing breakfast at good old IHOP.



In April, their latest adventure took them to new heights – literally. At the **Education Through Adventures** course in Stamford's Scalzi Park the girls, joined by Julie, the house Resident Director,

Jennienne Burke, and a few friends, climbed 28 feet to practice tight rope walking and communication skills. The course also required each person to learn some "repelling techniques" as they scaled





back down the 28-foot wall. During the afternoon the girls faced their fears and challenged themselves both physically and mentally. It was an amazing experience that taught valuable life lessons in a most unusual way.
